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The Mayor's Corner.

It is February already and the cold weather is upon us. I hope everyone is staying warm and safe. The winter weather of January was beautiful and we were spared some of the worst effects as no road issues were reported by our awesome police department. Power outages were limited in the state and for that I am very thankful. I am hopeful that February continues with the mild weather.

Speaking of our roads, there has been a great deal of discussion of roads lately. Whether it is the discussion of traffic controls (signals, stop signs, etc.) or the continued growth in our area, roads seem to stay at the forefront. In keeping with this, I thought I would give a brief update and explanation of the roads in our community. We have 44 miles of roads in our City. Some roads are City maintained, some are GaDOT, some are County and some are a combination of City and County. City roads are evaluated every five years by engineers that the City contracts with to determine which roads need to be improved



first. The engineers rate these based on critical infrastructure criteria.

The most traveled road, and one we get the most comments on, is Highway 8/Atlanta Highway. This is a State Route and is maintained by the Georgia Department of Transportation. The City is limited in what we can and can't do on this right-of-way. When there are areas of concern, such as the intersection of Etheridge Road and Atlanta Highway, we work with the GaDOT to try to resolve the issue. In the case of this intersection, we have been trying to get some type of traffic control there ever since I have been in office. The GaDOT has the final say on what happens here. We are pleased that there is renewed discussion on this intersection and we believe that a change will be coming soon. Many of our other roads are both City and County roads. We work closely with Barrow County so that we can coordinate when we are both going to perform a road repair/paving on the roads. Harmony Grove & Union Church Road repair was an example of this partnership. The City used two years of LMIG funding to repair the roads and worked with the County to be sure we coordinated the work so the entire road was done at once with the same contractor.

Speaking of funding, we take advantage of state funding called Local Maintenance & Improvement Grants (LMIG) to help pay for our road maintenance. This allocation of funds is based on our centerline miles (44 miles as mentioned above) This is a matching funds grant where the City pays 30% of the cost of the projects. We are allocated

between \$80,000 and \$92,000 each year. This table shows the projects that were completed in the last 2 years with these funds. The City is permitted to "save" the funds from several years to do larger projects as needed. In 2016, we used multiple years of LMIG funding for Harmony Grove and Union Church Road at a cost of over \$2,000,000. Since that time, we have been able to do maintenance/repaying on multiple roads. The City staff also works diligently to rectify road issues that occur throughout the year. There will be improvements on Highway 8/Atlanta Highway near the new Townes of Auburn, a deceleration lane near the new Municipal Complex, just a to name a couple. The City recognizes the need for more funding to take care of the roads. The 2023 SPLOST has roads as the second level of funding. Spanning six years, this SPLOST will provide much needed extra revenue to address the roads in the City. If the projections hold up, we expect over \$1,000,000 in revenue over the time span of the SPLOST. This revenue can only be spent on roads.

City staff and engineers are working diligently to make the best use of the funding available to us. We know that it can be frustrating waiting as some of these projects take years for the engineering and design to be complete. We hear your concerns. We encourage you to become more involved with the City so that you are aware of all the work that is done in the background to keep our City the great place you know and love. City Council meetings are held at 5PM on the 1st & 3rd Thursdays of every month and we'd love to see you there!

What is an Illicit Discharge?

An Illicit discharge is defined as "any discharge into a municipal storm sewer system that is not composed entirely of stormwater." Some of the pollutants that fall into this category are:

- -Car wash wastewater
- -Pesticides
- -Gas and motor oil
- -Pet waste
- -Grass clippings
- -Solvents
- -Household cleansers
- -Weed Killer
- -Paints



Sometimes these pollutants are carried through the storm drainage system by rain, wind, or improper disposal into Auburn's water ways. This can result in serious health and water quality problems. In addition, wildlife and the overall appearance of water ways are adversely affected by illicit discharges.

The City is working to identify illicit discharges by performing annual dry-weather outfall screenings. You can do your part and help the City of Auburn maintain an operating storm water system and healthy waterways by report illicit discharges. Illicit discharges along with any other water quality concerns may be reported by calling the Stormwater Coordinator: 770/963-4002 X 208.

Gardening Tip from the University of Georgia

Winter is a season of waiting for gardeners. But winter is the perfect time to work on our soil. When is the last time you had a soil test? Dr. Jason Lessl gives us a refresher on why and how to soil test. Dr. Lessl writes....

One of the most fundamental, but often overlooked aspects to any successful vegetable garden, flower bed, landscape, or lawn is good, fertile soil. Getting your soil tested by a laboratory is the best and most accurate way to assess your nutrient and pH levels which are vital components of maintaining your soil. The University of Georgia Soil, Plant, and Water lab offers such services

When you send a soil sample to a lab, you will receive a detailed report of soil nutrients levels along with crop-based recommendations on how to fix any potential deficiencies. The steps required to submit a soil sample are simple and can be achieved through a few items commonly found household items. You can start by contacting your local county extension office to acquire soil bags and get information on how to submit your samples. Dr. Lessl is a program coordinator for UGA's Soil, Plant, and Water Lab.
