The Mayor's Corner

April is here and nature's glory is abundant. We have concentrated so much on the pandemic recently that this month, I'd like to change it up a little. I have reached out to Alicia Holloway with the UGA extension office to talk about gardening. Here is some helpful information for our local gardeners. Enjoy!

Gardening has a long standing as America's most popular hobby, but even this common pastime saw a surge in popularity last year. As many of us were stuck at home looking for something, Mayor Linda anything, to do, a lot of folks tried veggie gardening for the first time. Gardening can be very Blechinaer rewarding...many of us find time outside digging in the dirt rewarding in and of itself, but then getting vine-ripened juicy heirloom tomatoes puts it over the top, and even adults get giddy digging potatoes or carrots out of the ground – it's like searching for buried treasure! But gardening can also present a lot of challenges, to new and experienced gardeners alike. You can avoid many garden issues by sticking to the basics, the time-tested and science-driven recommendations that have been proven successful time and time again. Below is a review of the basics to get you started this planting season.

Every Plant is Unique—Keep in mind all plants have different spacing, nutrition needs, and are prone to different insects and diseases. Do some plant-specific research to get the details right for each crop.

Location, Location, Location—Veggies need sunlight. Six hours is the minimum, but eight to ten hours is ideal. Well-drained soil is best, and convenience to water and to your kitchen is helpful. Healthy Veggies Start with Healthy Soil—Improve your soil by adding organic matter; compost is an easy and reliable option. Incorporate 2"-4" into the top 6" of soil. If you are using a raised bed, fill with 25%-50% with compost, and the rest with topsoil. Good old Georgia clay is great for growing after adding organic matter. The benefits of increased organic matter are immense: better water retention, ability for your soil to hold on to nutrients, increased aeration, and more. After adding organic matter, complete a soil test.

A soil test can tell you what nutrients are in your soil, and what nutrients you need to add. Soil tests can also tell you how to adjust your pH for optimum nutrient uptake. Your soil report will tell you the exact amount of fertilizer or lime you need to add to your garden to achieve top yields. Use the contact information below to get a soil test.

Plant in the Right Season—Plant summer vegetables after the last frost, and when soil temperatures reach 60-65 degrees Fahrenheit. Our last frost is usually around the end of March, and occasionally into early April. Go to georgiaweather.net, select past data, and then 7-day summary to see the 4' inch soil temperature over the past week. Plants need Personal Space (a.k.a. Social Distancing for Plants) - Your seed packet or plant tag, and the UGA Vegetable planting chart will give recommended spacings. Follow the recommendations! Plants packed too tightly compete for nutrients and are prone to diseases. Plants spaced to widely invite weeds and give less yield per square foot of garden space. For raised beds, use mostly in-row spacing recommendations for smaller crops, but make sure you leave plenty of space between large crops like tomatoes or peppers.

Water is Life—Mulch around the base of vegetables with straw or a garden soil mix to hold in moisture during hot summer months. This can also reduce soil-borne pathogens like many of the fungal diseases that affect tomatoes. When watering, water deeply and less often. Watering deeply will encourage roots to grow deep and make stronger plants.

Protect against Invaders—Here in the south we have all the pests. When you see a potential pest or disease, bring it to me, your agriculture and natural resources agent. I can identify the issue if there is one and if needed, give recommendations for practices that will reduce the number of pests, and chemical treatments if needed, organic or conventional, whatever your preference. Follow these garden basics for a great garden this year. What is 811?

811 is the national number designated by the Federal Communications Commission to help protect do-it-yourselfers, landscapers and contractors from unintentionally hitting underground utility lines while working on digging projects - large and small.

Why contact Georgia 811?

- · For Safety's Sake! Hitting an underground utility line while digging can cause damage to the environment and/or serious personal injuries.
- Convenience: Failure to contact Georgia 811 can result in disrupted service to an entire neighborhood and potentially incur fines and repair costs.
- It's free. Georgia 811 exists to prevent utility and safety emergencies, and it's a free service!
- It's the law. Please visit the Georgia Public Service Commission's web site at psc.state.ga.us/ for more information on Georgia's "Dig Law", the Georgia Facilities Protection Act.

When should someone contact 811?

Do-it-yourselfers and contractors should reach 811 at least two business days before ANY digging project.

A few common examples include but are not limited to:

- Putting in a fence
- Planting trees or shrubbery
- Installing a sprinkler system
- Pool installation
- Installing a mailbox
- · Grading, boring or trenching

How does 811 work?

Notifving Georgia 811 kick-starts a process that is crucial to any outdoor digging project. Digging after utility lines have been marked prevents possible mishaps that could otherwise occur during an outdoor project. The service is free and the process is simple:

- The digger contacts Georgia 811 by dialing 811or visiting Georgia811.com and submitting an eRequest form at 1. least two business days prior to digging.
- Georgia 811 then transmits the location and description of the project to the affected member utility companies. 2. After receiving the information, these utility companies send a professional locate technician to identify and mark the approximate location of lines with colored paint or flags.
- 3 Once underground lines have been marked, the digger now knows the approximate location of utility lines and can dig safely

What if 811 is not contacted?

- An underground line is damaged every three minutes nationwide and nearly 1,300 damages are reported to Georgia 811 each month.
- Damage to underground lines can result in service interruptions, costly repair bills and fines.
- Hitting a line can also cause serious harm to the digger and other individuals.

Why is April so important?

- April is National Safe Digging Month, as well as Safe Digging Month in Georgia by declaration of the governor.
- According to consumer behavior trends, April marks the beginning of the peak period for outdoor digging projects in Georgia and nationwide.
- Raising safe digging awareness in April encourages citizens to contact 811 during an optimum time for utility line protection.

How has safe digging increased?

- In 2020, Georgia 811 took 1,359,090 requests to have underground utility lines located. • In 2020, Georgia 811 took
- 69.8% of locates on the web. For each request 7.2 member companies on average were
- notified that digging would be taking place in their service area.
