## From the Chief of Police:

#### Time Change Ahead — Drive With Extra Care

As we prepare to "fall back" this November, the end of Daylight Saving Time brings earlier sunsets and darker evenings across Auburn. While the extra hour of sleep is welcome, the shift in daylight also affects visibility, driving habits, and the routines of families, students, and pedestrians in our community.

#### Why This Matters for Safety

When the clock changes, daily patterns don't — kids still walk or ride bikes home from after-school programs, people still jog in the evenings, and families still run errands after work. The difference is that **much more of this activity will now take place in reduced light.** 

Studies consistently show an increase in traffic accidents in the weeks immediately following the time change due to:

- Reduced visibility during evening commutes
- **Driver fatigue** during routine schedule adjustments
- Difficulty seeing children and pedestrians at dusk
- Increased glare from headlights and wet roads in fall weather

#### What You Can Do to Keep Auburn Safe

Together, we can reduce risks by making small but important changes:

#### For Drivers

- Slow down in neighborhoods, school zones, and crosswalk areas
- Use headlights earlier don't wait until it's fully dark
- Avoid distractions and give full attention to the roadway
- Be aware that children may be harder to see at dusk

#### For Parents & Pedestrians

- Encourage kids to wear reflective or brightly colored clothing if outside at dusk
- Remind children to avoid running into the street between parked cars
- Use sidewalks and crosswalks whenever possible
- Carry small lights or reflectors during evening walks

#### A Community Priority

Auburn's safety depends on all of us adjusting to the seasonal change with caution and awareness. Whether you're picking up dinner, taking your dog out, or heading home from work, please remember: it gets dark earlier, but people are still out.

Let's look out for each other, slow down, and make sure everyone gets home safely this fall.

Stay safe, Auburn — and thank you for helping keep our streets and families protected.
